Prof Hew publishes in Nature Communications

Prof Hew Gill, President & Provost of UCB, is a member of the 82-strong international research team which has just published a ground-breaking research paper in the prestigious journal Nature Communications. The article entitled "Changes in Social Norms during the Early Stages of the COVID-19 Pandemic across 43 Countries" is a global collaboration that studied how social norms changed in response to the threat of disease during the COVID-19 pandemic. Drawing on the influential tightness-looseness theory, which proposes that societies become "tighter" or more normatively constrained when exposed to threats such as earthquakes, disease, wars, or famine, they anticipated that social norms would tighten after the emergence of COVID-19. To test this, they built a unique dataset that combines rich existing data on social norms, collected just before the pandemic, with data that they collected from nearly 15,000 people in the same populations across the globe during the first months of the pandemic. By doing this, the researchers were able to identify how multiple social norms changed after the emergence of the disease.

Surprisingly, and in contrast to expectations, tightness changed little as did most of other measures of social norms. Instead, social norms of handwashing, a norm perceived to be directly relevant to the threat of disease, became substantially stronger. These results suggest that in the early stages of the COVID-19 pandemic, norms specifically related to the threat changed quickly, while unrelated social norms took longer, or required different threats, to change. This work makes a fundamental contribution to our understanding of social norm change and may help anticipate the future reactions of countries to similar crises, as well as suggest intervention strategies to deal with future crises rapidly and effectively.

Language Martyrs Day Commemoration

February 21st dawned with a poignant resonance in the hearts of millions of Bangladeshis at home and worldwide. The significance of this day, known as Ekushey February, reverberated deeply throughout the nation.

The presence of all UCB students and staff at a commemorative event was a testament to the enduring legacy of those brave souls. Students, faculty, and support team members stood shoulder to shoulder, united in their respect for the martyrs. Students, dressed in traditional attire, formed a vibrant mixture of colors, symbolizing the richness of Bengali culture.

The day unfolded with a series of activities aimed at respecting the sacrifices made by members of the language movement. Students presented a short play that was written, directed and acted by students from across UCB.

The drama was laden with emotion, echoing the sentiments of a nation that refused to be silenced. Leap Year Day

February 29th only comes once every four years, so UCB celebrated the rare event of Leap Year Day. Students made artworks on the theme of Leap Year, with the leaping frog emerging as a common motif to symbolise the Leap Year Day. The commonly accepted origin of the term Leap Year is that normally each day advances by one date in the calendar each year, but after a Leap Year the days advance by two dates.

The Leap Year brings the calendar back in line with the orbit of the Earth around the Sun which takes approximately 365 ¹/₄ days, so every fourth year an extra day is added to the calendar. There are many strange traditions associated with February 29th, particularly the idea that the roles of men and women are reversed. People born on February 29th are known as 'Leaplings', but for many official purposes their birth date will be set to 28th February so that they are able to go to school, begin voting, get married, etc at the same age as other people.

Fyruz Business Workshop
